
THEME DAYS IN SUPPORT OF AUTISM ACCEPTANCE MONTH


On Friday April 7th we'll wear our comfiest outfit or PJs. Autistic people feel sensory overload every day, so we will wear our comfiest clothes or our pajamas and really focus on what makes us feel comfy and calm.



Indoor Garden

The Junior Intermediate PSP Class has been working with the Classroom Gardens Program (supported by the Ottawa Network for Education,) to get our vermicomposting garden tower up and running. This is part of the Science, Social Studies/Geography and even the Math curricula - all related to sustainable food practices, ecosystems. We are hoping to include a little math by coding our microbits to have them run a water pump and create a self watering system.

The students have seen this project through from start to finish. They planted the seeds, tracked and tended to them. They helped transplant the seedlings into the garden tower and have been responsible for watering them several times a week. They collect compost daily and will help to put it into the center of the tower to feed our composting worms. This works to make nutrient rich soil to keep our plants fed and healthy. Eventually, they helped to harvest the veggies.







Sikh Heritage Month



On Monday April 8, 2024, there will be a total solar eclipse. Ottawa, located in the Northern Region, will experience a partial solar eclipse. During a total or partial solar eclipse it is not safe to look directly at the sun without appropriate protective eye wear. Doing so may result in permanent eye damage.

The eclipse occurring on April 8 will last for 2 hours 23 minutes, beginning at 2:11p.m. and ending at 4:35 p.m. with the maximum point of the eclipse at 3:25 p.m. Virtually all school and program dismissal times occur during that window. To ensure student safety, many school districts, including those in Ottawa, have rescheduled a Professional Activity (PA) day to April 8, allowing students to stay home. Regrettably, the Ottawa-Carleton District School Board (OCDSB) does not have a PA day that can be moved.

After exploring several options and consulting with key stakeholders, a local operational decision has been made to close all OCDSB schools on April 8th. Transportation will also be cancelled. In addition, OCDSB operated Extended Day Programs will not operate.

Please note:

The OCDSB Toddler Preschool programs will operate as usual.

The OCDSB EarlyOn Child and Family Centres will operate as per usual.

Will your child be 4 years old by December 31, 2024? You can register for Kindergarten at the Ottawa-Carleton District School Board. Kindergarten at the OCDSB is a safe, caring and inclusive learning environment where children learn to explore the world, solve problems and make friends.

We offer:

- A full-day, two-year, fully bilingual program with 50% English instruction and 50% French instruction;
- An emphasis on dynamic, play-based learning for a fun way to help children learn and discover; and
- A caring team of educators with each class having a teacher and early childhood educators.
- Extended Day Programs that provide your child with the opportunity to participate in activities that complement what happens during the regular school day.

1. Parent Information Sessions

Your local school will be holding a parent information session. 3. Prepare for Kindergarten

Starting Kindergarten is an exciting adventure for children and their families. But beginning something new can also cause big feelings. Your child might be excited, nervous, scared, curious, or even shy.

- Recognize your own feelings around this milestone and share them with friends and family
- Attend, virtually or in-person, the "Welcome to Kindergarten" opportunities at your child's school
- Visit the school and the playground
- If your child takes the bus, attend the OSTA orientation day
